The Camp was opened in November 1996 to host Persons of Concern fleeing conflicts in DRC. Prior to April 2015, the camp hosted 65,000 DRC and 2.400 Burundian Persons of Concern. 84.961 Burundians arrived between April and October 2015 were being hosted in Nyarugusu before

relocation of close to 40,000 Burundian refugees to Nduta and Mtendeli between October 2015 and February 2016 respectively. The camp continues to receive Asylum Seekers mainly from DRC, amidst a resettlement process that is mainly targeting Congolese who arrived in Tanzania between 1994 and 2005






Biometrically Registered Population Growth






Average Number of New Arrivals per Day DEC-16


Age & Gender Breakdown of Biom. Reg. Refugees

Current Services

Following Services are available in the camp:

One (1) Hospital, two (2) Health Centers, five (5) Health Posts; Twenty (20) Primary Schools (12 for the congolease popuplation and 8 for the burudian population); Six (6) Secondary Schools (4 for the congolease population and 2 for the burundian population); Three (3) Youth and two (2) Women's Centers; Three (3) Food Distribution Centers; Two (2) Police Posts; One (1) Common Market; Two (2) Community based Rehabilitation Centers; 148 Solars Streets lights.

Community Organization

The camp community is organized around 3 levels of entities (Zones, Villages and Clusters) and managed by an Excutive Commit tee. We have one Leader for each community entity and a total of 783 community Leaders.
