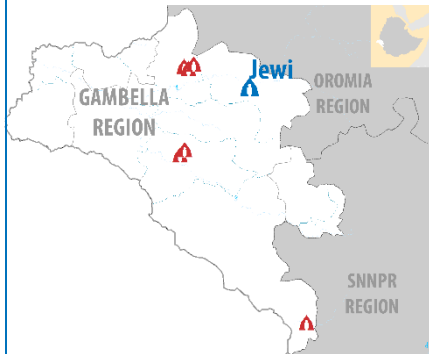

Contextual Background

Historical background	Jewi Refugee Camp was established on 15 March 2015 and hosts refugees relocated from Leitchuor and Nip Nip following floods that left refugees in both locations homeless. This led to establishment of the camp which offered home for refugees to settle and live in safety and dignity. Leitchuor was established in late January in 2014 and received refugees relocated from Ethiopian border entry points of Akobo, Pagak, Burbiey, Pochalla.
Areas of Origin	The camp population comprises of refugees mainly from South Sudan's Unity, Upper Nile and Jonglei states.
Cultural Background	The refugees are predominantly ethnic Luo-Nuer with other few minorities.
Main Occupations	Primarily farmers and pastoralists.

Administrative Structure

UNHCR ensures **Coordination in close collaboration** with **ARRA**, provides **International Protection** and multi-sector assistance.

Camp Management and the implementation of distribution of Food and **Core Relief Items, Demarcation and Provision of plots for Shelters, Refugee Screening / Registration** is conducted by **Administration for Refugee and Returnee Affairs (ARRA)** with support from **UNHCR**.

UN Agencies comprised of WFP, UNICEF, UNFPA and **Partners** work together with ARRA and UNHCR in the provision of various essential services.

Individual Registration - All refugees residing in Jewi camp are L2 registered. New born babies are registered on monthly basis.

Coordination activities - camp coordination meeting is co-chaired by ARRA and UNHCR on monthly basis. Other bi-lateral meetings with the Refugee Central committee, Women and youth groups are conducted regularly.

Operations and Services

Detailed Individual registration: Refugees are individually registered in UNHCR's ProGres database. Photos and fingerprints are recorded for each individual to avoid double registration. Registered refugees are issued with the Proof of Registration document and a Ration Card. Other activities include registration of New Born Babies, split and merging of household for family re-unification, transfers, etc.

Education: ARRA implements primary education in 4 schools. Registration for the new academic year is ongoing. The schools are expected to resume on the first week of October.

Secondary education is facilitated by World Vision International, the construction of classrooms and other basic facilities has been completed. SCI implements ECCD programs.

Child Protection and Youth Education program: SCI provides recreation activities to children, adolescents and youths in the Child Friendly Spaces located in all zones. Un-accompanied minors and Separated children are supported with psychosocial services, material support, counselling, home visits, and family re-unifications. PLAN International, IMC and LWF provide various awareness programs, Reproductive Health education, Peace education, sports and recreation activities to adolescents, youth and young adults at the respective youth centers.

Health and Nutrition: ARRA continued to provide health services to both refugees and the surrounding host community. The Basic Nutrition services, Reproductive Health and GBV prevention and response services are provided by IMC to the refugee community.

Shelter: The current transitional shelter coverage is 62% and emergency shelter is 38%. Community members participate in mud plastering and thatching the roofs. The shelter partners continue with the maintenance of shelters.











WASH activities: The water supply is through permanent water system, the average water supply stands at 16 liters/person/day. Household latrine coverage is 40% and the latrine access is 1:11. Community outreach activities include hygiene promotions and campaigns.

Food: Food distribution is implemented by ARRA. The WFP food basket comprises of wheat, Corn Soy Blend, pulses and oil.

Core Relief Items (CRI): The new relocated refugees received all CRIs upon arrival in the camp, however, the old caseload continues to approach UNHCR field office and request for the replacement of CRIs.

Refugee Central Committee: The newly appointed Refugee Central Committee (RCC) continued to represent refugee community on issues of concerns and share the information with ARRA, UNHCR and other agencies providing services in the camp. Information from ARRA, UNHCR and partners to the community is through RCC.
