Progress on development of Referral Pathway		 to CM as well as advocacy and systems strengthening; Head of JPD mentioned that patrolling in areas around schools have reduced incidents of harassment and violence faced by pupils; World Vision member shared that for their remedial class project they have liaised with the community police to strengthen safety at educational premises; UNHCR supported draft of two SWG documents: 5W and Referral Pathways (attached); 5W covers a broad spectrum of CP and related activities and is broader than the referral pathways; currently 29 agencies are represented, including 2 governmental bodies (FPD, JPD), 5 national NGOs; 22 INGOs; aim is to strengthen national NGOs and governmental representation; Suggestion to have NCFA coordinate the inputs from national partners, such as FPD, JPD, MOSD and MOL; Referral Pathways: see attached, is mainly linked to case management and related services; feedback requests have been shared and final deadline is 23 August; Information from 5W feeds into the Referral Pathways, however, CPSWG members are owners of those documents and shall verify information presented in both documents for their agencies; 	-	Final feedback by partners on the attached two documents by no later than Thursday, 23 August 2018; CPSWG co-chairs to follow up with FP and NCFA to include national partners; 5W and Referral Pathways are attached; final draft to be shared by end of September to be followed by gap analysis to plan for 2019;	- co-chairs SWG;
