

West Africa Monthly 4Mi Update



Overview

In April, the Mixed Migration Monitoring Mechanism Initiative (4Mi) conducted 311 in-depth interviews with migrants and refugees in West Africa, including 104 people in Agadez and Niamey in Niger; and 207 people in Mopti, Gao, Ber and Timbuktu in Mali.


Profiles


In April, 203 men and 108 women from 19 countries in Central and Western Africa were interviewed, with an average age of 28 years.



Asylum


Of those interviewed, 10 respondents from Cameroon, Chad, Gabon, Ivory Coast, Nigeria and Sudan have already applied for asylum in Niger. 48% of those interviewed said that they intend to apply for asylum in their country of destination. 3. Intention to apply for asylum

4. Motivations for departure




28% of women and 8% of men reported that personal or family reasons were a part of their motivation for leaving their home country. Among these respondents, 18 respondents reported having fled because of domestic violence and 17 respondents because of a death in their family. 9 women said they had fled forced marriages in Guinea, Ghana, Niger and Nigeria.

Journey

Those interviewed in April indicated different criteria for choosing their migration route, including ease of access (219), price (192), security (121), recommandations from friends or family (83) or choice of route by the smuggler (35).

48% of respondents indicated that they made the decision to leave on their own. 37% of respondents were encouraged to migrate by friends, 18% by siblings, 18% by parents and 14% by other family members.



5. People who encourage to migrate


Protection and vulnerabilities


13% of women and 5% of men interviewed reported that they witnessed or experienced sexual abuse. 26 cases were reported, most often committed by smugglers (8 cases) and other migrants or non-related person on the move (6 cases).

Women and men surveyed reported 88 cases of physical abuse, most often committed by security forces, police or military (32 cases), smugglers (13 cases), groups of thugs (10 cases) and immigration officials (9 cases).

Migrants and refugees interviewed also reported 53 cases of theft. These robberies most often concerned money (34 cases) and/or personal belongings (33 cases).

44% of women and 45% of men paid bribes to immigration officers, an average of three times during their journey and an average of 8,000CFA francs per bribe (14 USD).





7. Incidents map

This map includes cases of physical and sexual abuses, deaths, detention and robberies reported by migrants and refugees interviewed by the 4Mi in April in Mali Burkina Faso and Niger. These reported protection incidents were witnessed or experienced by respondents. In total, 193 incidents were reported in Mali, Niger and Burkina Faso in April, including 34 in Agadez, 26 in Bamako, 14 in Mopti, 13 in Sikasso and Ouagadougou, 12 in Kayes and 10 in Segou.

The Mixed Migration Monitoring Mechanism Initiative (4Mi) is an innovative approach for the collection and analysis of data along major mixed migration corridors, responding to the need for better data on protection issues with regards to asylum seekers, refugees and other people on the move. In Niger and Mali, 4Mi seeks to help fill the knowledge gaps regarding the nature of the mixed migratory movements and the protection risks for migrants and refugees on the move within and from West Africa.

4Mi data, graphics and analysis are based on the accumulated, ongoing data collection by 4Mi field monitors through direct interviews with migrants/refugees on the move. Sample sizes are clearly indicated and represent a limited section of those on the move. All findings derived from the surveyed sample of migrants/refugees and should not be used to make any inferences about the total population of any mixed migration flow.
