1.1. Integration of refugees within the national education system

- Towards favourable legal environments
- Attempts of curriculum adaptation
- Costed education response plans
- Gradual inclusion of refugee education data into national systems
- Coordination structures at all levels and inclusion into national planning
- Harmonisation of employment and training of refugee teachers

Challenges and lessons learned

1.1. Integration of refugees within the national education system



- High drop out rates
- Language barrier
- Recognition of qualification and certification
- Infrastructure (classrooms, furniture, instructional materials etc)
- Multi-year, predictable and sustainable funding
- Skill recognition
- Coordination
- Children with special needs

Opportunities

1.1. Integration of refugees within the national education system



- Full integration
- Costed plans with adequate funding
- Coordination structures (national-local-donor community)
- Skill recognition
- Regional system for recognition of qualification and certification
- Increased development funding
- Global Refugee Forum opportunity for more responsibility-sharing

Best Practices 1.2 Access to civil documentation



- Permissive legal framework for refugees to access civil documentation
- Civil documentation not mandatory for access to service and other rights
- One-stop-shops in camps which provide vital statistics service
- Comprehensive level 3 registration system linked to national immigration database for issuance of national IDs
- Good coordination between line ministries

Challenges and lessons learned 1.2 Access to civil documentation



- Better harmonisation of national civil registration systems
- Digitalisation of civil registration system
- Backlog of birth registration for refugees and host communities
- Limited funding
- Limited awareness of refugee documentation by other stakeholders e.g. banks, private sector

Opportunities 1.2 Access to civil documentation



- Refugee access to civil documentation contributes to the national economy and other social services
- Acceptability of issued civil documents in IGAD countries
- Coordination between Government and partners
- Strengthening capacity of national and local institutions
- Use of existing systems and processes and promoting linkages
