

KYAKA II REFUGEE SETTLEMENT 2012 BURUNDIAN REGISTRATION ANALYSIS

OVERVIEW

2624 new arrivals were registered in UGAMU proGres database as of 21 December 2012; of which 142 were Burundians. Burundians accounted for 5.41% of the total new arrivals registered in 2012.



The bar graph below illustrates the monthly trends of Burundian new arrival registrations in 2012. November recorded the highest number of Burundians registered; August had no Burundian registered while September had the lowest figure because this is the time the general verification exercise was conducted in Kyaka II.

In totality, more males than female Burundians were registered in 2012; 78 representing 55% while the females were 64 representing 45%.



The largest population of Burundians registered in Kyaka II in 2012 was in age cohort 18-59 with 53 individuals followed where as the list was 60+ with only 3 individuals.

The Burundians registered in Kyaka II came from diverse areas in Burundi but majority where from Kirundo followed by Ngozi, Karuzi and Gitega as shown in the table and pie chart above. Major entry point into Uganda was Kagitumba according to information received from the new arrivals.

2 Refugee Eligibility Committee (REC) sessions were conducted in Kyaka II refugee settlement this year. 65 Burundians attended the 2 REC sessions of which 49 were granted refugee status while 16 were rejected as illustrated in the table below.

The flight reasons presented by the Burundian new arrivals were mainly abduction of relatives especially male ones and insecurity.

By 21 December, a total 59 households of 140 Burundians were registered in UGAMU database; 2 individuals where however family reunions bringing the total number of Burundians registered in 2012 to 142 since no registration was done after 21 December 2012.

Female headed households accounted for 44.1% while male headed households 55.9% thus more male headed households than female headed where registered. The family sizes registered where between family size 1 and 7, the majority being family size 1.
