# **GREECE** Accommodation update



In Kilkis, a small city in northern Greece, families uprooted by conflict in Syria have found peace and a place to call home.

### Overview

By the end of November, UNHCR had created 18,927 places in the accommodation scheme as part of the ESTIA programme. These were in 3,092 separate facilities, in 21 cities across Greece.

The Accommodation Scheme<sup>1</sup> provides rented housing to vulnerable asylum-seekers and refugees in Greece. Urban accommodation helps restore a sense of normalcy and provides better access to services, including education and health. People are additionally supported by social workers and interpreters who help them access medical services, employment, language courses and recreational activities. **18,927** Number of accommodation places <sup>2</sup>

# Demographics

In total, since November 2015, 38,534 individuals have benefitted from the accommodation scheme. 15,144 people were accommodated as of the end of November 2017, over half of whom were children. The vast majority of those accommodated are families, with the average family size of four people. One in four residents have at least one of the vulnerabilities that make them eligible for the accommodation scheme. The three most common vulnerabilities are:


<sup>1</sup> The scheme also facilitates the eventual integration of those who will remain in Greece, while the host population benefits from the renting of their apartments. UNHCR works with NGOs as well as a number of municipalities around Greece to provide rented accommodation in apartments, buildings, host families and hotels. The accommodation scheme commenced in Nov. 2015. <sup>2</sup>UNHCR implementing partners. ## Demographics

The vast majority, 83% of individuals in the accommodation scheme are Syrian, Iraqi, Afghan, Palestinian or Iranian. However, the individuals accommodated as of the end of November 2017 speak 31 different languages as a mother tongue.


# Accommodation Type

Over four in five accommodation units are apartments, followed by buildings and hotels (11% and 2% respectively).




### Partners

At the end of November 2017, the accommodation scheme had 15 partners, the seven NGOs and eight municipalities: Praksis, Iliaktida, CRS, Arsis, Solidarity Now, Nostos, Intersos, and the municipalities of Athens (ADDMA), Thessaloniki (MUNTHESS), Livadia (KEDHL), Trikala (E-TRIKALA), Karditsa (ANKA), Larissa (DIKEL), Nea Philadelphia - Nea Chalkidona (KEDFX), and a consortium of municipalities in Crete (HDA). In total, partners managed by UNHCR provided 94% of the accommodation spaces in Greece. Partners GCR and METAdrasi also provide social, legal and interpretation support.



#### Location of accommodation

Accommodation for asylum-seekers and refugees is provided in 21 cities in Greece. Over half, 65% of the accommodation places are located in Athens, with 6% currently on the islands.



### Total beneficiaries

In total, since November 2015, 38,534 individuals have benefitted from the accommodation scheme.

UNHCR's Accommodation Scheme is part of the ESTIA programme (Emergency Support to Integration and Accommodation) of the E.U. Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid (ECHO).
