

WASH Workshop -DRAFT Program Informal Settlement and Urban WASH: meeting needs better



Objective:

Reflecting on progress to date, current situation and future outlook agree on key strategic recommendations (particularly regarding prioritization and targeting; communication and advocacy; and common approaches, modalities and standards) to ensure emergency, basic and maintainable WASH needs are met in the most cost-effective way in line with sector and LCRP objectives.

In light of decreased funding and the protracted nature of the crisis there is a need for stakeholders of the water sector involved in the WASH response; to have a common understanding of the current situation and outlook; to reflect on the successes and failures of initiatives since the beginning of the response; to showcase innovative solutions; to share challenges and understand bottlenecks, gaps, coping mechanisms and cross-sectoral implications; and to agree on recommendations in accordance with the workshop objective.
