



Italy - Unaccompanied and Separated Children (UASC) Dashboard

Between 1 January and 31 August 2018, 3,092 unaccompanied and separated children arrived in Italy by sea, representing 15 per cent of all sea arrivals in this period. Consistent with an overall decrease in sea arrivals this year so far, the numbers of UASC reaching Italian shores in the first eight months of 2018 are considerably lower than in the same period last year, when over 13,200 landed in Italy. However, the proportion of UASC among sea arrivals in the January-August 2018 period (15 per cent) is only slightly higher than in January-August 2017 (13 per cent).


UASC and accompanied children sea arrivals trend, 2017 and 2018






It is estimated that UASC arriving by sea in the first eight months of 2018 most commonly originated from Tunisia (637), Eritrea (584), and Sudan (252). During this period, significant numbers of UASC arrivals also originated from Côte d'Ivoire (190), Pakistan (187), Mali (163), Nigeria (157), Somalia (143), Guinea (142) and Algeria (107).

According to UNHCR estimates, almost half of UASC arrivals in the January-August 2018 period (48 per cent) originated from Eritrea, Tunisia and Sudan. Furthermore, UASC from the ten most common nationalities cumulatively represent 83 per cent of UASC arriving by sea in the first eight months of 2018. Between 1 January and 31 August 2018, 36 per cent of Sierra Leonean arrivals were UASC, followed by 34 per cent of Somali arrivals, 24 per cent of Gambians, 19 per cent of Eritreans, 19 per cent of Malians, and 18 per cent of Ivoirians.

While the proportion of UASC among Eritrean arrivals so far this year (19 per cent) is largely comparable to the same period last year (17 per cent), the proportions of UASC among Tunisian and Sudanese sea arrivals have risen to 17 per cent and 16 per cent, respectively (compared to 10 per cent and 7 per cent in the same period last year).

Most UASC arriving by sea are boys and are 16 and 17 years old. However, exact figures on gender of UASC arrivals are currently unavailable.

The charts are based on figures from the Italian Ministry of Interior and on UNHCR estimates. All figures are provisional and subject to change.
