# While Kenya has emerged as an East African leader in measuring displacement, comparable socioeconomic data remain scarce



- Refugees in Kenya are not systematically included in national surveys
- Few data on welfare and poverty exist that are comparable to the national population
- Through the UNHCR-World Bank collaboration, this assessment helps close data gaps by using micro-level socioeconomic data of refugees to inform policy and targeted programming





#### Overview of work in Kenya

 Kalobeyei Socio-economic Assessment Survey in 2018, conducted parallel to the UNHCR Registration verification exercise

- Kakuma Socio-economic Assessment Survey in 2019 representative of the refugees in Kakuma camp (Sample – 2,127)
- Shona Socio-economic Assessment Survey in 2019, conducted parallel to the Registration activity that was aimed at preparing the application for citizenship for qualifying members of the Shona community
  - Sample Shona living in/around Nairobi county
- Kenya COVID-19 Impact Phone survey a bi-monthly panel data on the impact of COVID-19
  - Sample representative of nationals, refugees (Kakuma, Kalobeyei, Dadaab, Urban) and the Shona





# Refugees in Kalobeyei are younger than the Kenyan population, with virtually no elders






- Amongst refugees, there are virtually no elders, with only 1.7 percent age 50 years and above.
- Estimated 3,100 unaccompanied minors and 8,656 separated children (UNHCR protection 2018)




#### Among the working population, labour force participation rates are low



- Working population (15 64 years) Kalobeyei (39%); Kenya (55%); Turkana (46%)
- Unemployment rate is especially low for working-age women, who make up a larger share of the total population but are less likely to be working



# Refugees in Kalobeyei are less likely to be poorer than the host community, but more likely to be poorer than Kenyans in general




• More than half of refugees are poor. This is higher than the national rate (37%), lower than in Turkana County (72%), and comparable to the average of Kenya's 15 poorest counties (59%)





## Food Shortages in the last month due to lack of enough money or other resources




- Majority of primary school children were attending school before the outbreak and attendance rates were found to be very similar among persons of concern and nationals – Kakuma (82%), Kalobeyei (77%), Shona (81%) and national (82%)
- The main channels for doing learning-related activities are reading school textbooks, educational radio programs, free online/mobile educational videos and self-prepared materials




# Majority of persons of concern have less access to health facilities than before March mainly due to fear of getting infected by Coronavirus

#### Less access to Health Facilities than before March 2020




#### Reasons for less access to health facilities




### **Employment outcomes are worse for persons of concern**


