







## Overview

The Proof of Registration (PoR) card is an important protection tool that is issued by Government of Pakistan and provides temporary legal stay and freedom of movement for the 1.4 million registered Afghan refugees in Pakistan. All the PoR cards that expired at the end of 2015 have been extended through official notification until 30 June 2020\*.

The four PoR Card Modification centres (PCM) are located in Peshawar, Quetta, Karachi and Rawalpindi. These centres are used for the modification and replacement of existing cards; the registration of infants and children up to the age of five years; the issuance of new cards for eligible children who are five years and older; and the issuance of birth certificates to children under the age of 18.

In 2020, UNHCR prioritised funds for birth registration and the issuance of birth certificates to 25,000 children. The target for the issuance of individual PoR cards is 185,000 children who have reached five years of age and are eligible to receive their individual cards from the PCM centres.

During the reporting month some 2,393 persons benefited from registration services. UNHCR and NADRA has resumed all the registration activities at all PCM centres from 17 August 2020.

\*The validity of Proof of Registration (PoR) cards for refugees had not yet been extended. The PoR cards expired on 30 June 2020.







The following charts summarise the progress towards these targets and the remaining gaps.

The percentages for birth registrations, birth certificate issuance and provision of PoR cards to registered children that have reached five years of age are based on the esti-mates noted on page 1. These overall targets have been apportioned to each centre based on the size of the Afghan refugee population for which the centre provides services.

During August, the trend in child registration activities remained unchanged compared to those before the suspension of activities in March 2020 at all PCM centres countrywide due to COVID-19 outbreak (a total of 685 children were registered in August 2020 at all the PCM centres countrywide compared to 1,301 in the month of March 2020). The issuance of birth certificates is temporarily suspended by NADRA HQ. UNHCR is following-up with NADRA HQ to resolve the issue on a priority basis.

In 2020, based on cost-benefit analysis with PCM centres and discussions on the best interests for persons of concern, UNHCR will continue to deploy 3 Mobile Registration Vans (MRVs) in KP, Balochistan and in Punjab (for a period of four months each). The deployment of MRVs was very successful in 2019. Mobile Registration Van provides services for applicants living in remote areas of KP, Punjab and Balochistan, facilitating those who can't afford to travel to PCM centres.

In December 2019, UNHCRs issued the new policy for the collection of all un-delivered modified PoR cards. The policy entails that the PoR card holders who wish to modify their cards will be given 13x months to collect their previous cards from respective PCM centers. If they fail to collect their modified PoR cards within given timeframe, their cards shall be withdrawn and these PoR card holders will be deregistered from NADRA database, leading to cancellation of refugee status. The 13x months period will start from the date on which PoR card is received at PCM center.

It should be noted that the trend for PoR card modifications will naturally follow that of birth registrations and the provision of PoR cards to children over five. This is because children are added or removed from their parents' cards, and their parents' cards will need to be modified.

From 1 January to 31 August 2020, 3,245 lost or stolen cards were replaced. Deaths of refugees continue to be significantly underreported. Only 8 deaths were registered/reported between January to August 2020.
