Update on COVID-19

- Globally 6 million cases recorded. 2070.000 recorded last night .65000 death.
- In Jordan for the past few days cases are getting up beyond 60% in the region compare to other countries. Total confirmed cases since March-2020 is 20,200 and recovered cases are 5,720. Approximately 1,060 under treatment. 134 deaths as per yesterday statistics. Total number of PCR tests conducted is 1.3 million.
- Since 3rd of September the distribution of confirmed cases number get significantly increased from 1 int-13.
- MOH isolation policy is changed and shifted into self-home isolation. The draft of home isolation protocol is developed. WHO got the draft copy and ready to circulate once approved.
- Covid-19 vaccine. GAVI/WHO/GAVI are leading the COVAX Facility, a global platform to ensure equitable allocation of vaccines across countries. COVAX Facility will ensure distribution of vaccine doses to immunize 20% of Jordan population by December 2021. Jordan is o joined the COVAX Facility in September 2020.
- Situation on pandemic is dynamic and fluid.
- OXFORD modality: In May WHO in collaboration with MoH used a model recommend by WHO regional office to predict the impact of Covid-19 in Jordan in the mana ahead .they tried to predict the number of cases and deaths using the data from March-May 2020 to developed and to randomly projected it up to December 2020.
- Then they came up with four scenarios: one of the them is the full lockdown up to December 2020 and the other three is the relaxing of the public health measure (opening school, restaurants, working from home etc...). They find out back to May 2020 that there is no big expectation that the first scenario the complete lockdown is to last until to December 2020 and things will be under control. The situation was completely not under control due to economic opening with the predict 3 scenarios the model predict second peak of the virus in the second part of 2020 with increase in number of cases and deaths. Until mid-August these predictions were wrong. They find out that this model predicted is in away materialized. With the current pedological situation the Royal Court has requested WHO to meet with the WHO Regional Office and to update this model. This evening WHO will be meeting with Royal Court and MoH to update this model.
- Flu / Influenza vaccine. WHO supported MoH with 240,000 flu vaccine and will be given according to the vulnerability criteria.

| Zaatri and Azraq Camps | <p>Zaatari</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Za’atari, the MSF treatment centre is ready. They got approval of MoH to start functioning their center with 30 beds capacity. The centre will be receiving inpatient admission for mild, moderate – severe cases of COVID-19 in the camp. ▪ UNHCR build the capacity of the isolation centers in both camps Azraq and Zataari (Zatari capacity 280 beds). ▪ In Za’atari Camp, the confirmed positive COVID-19 cases amount to five (by 08 October), one of which has already recovered and returned from the Dead Sea back to the Camp. Among the three active cases is a seven-year-old child staying at the transit / isolation area (jointly with th emother and other family members). The three active cases also include a 75-year-old kidney dialysis patient. ▪ In Za’atari surveillance at camp gate also continues using the primary health care facilities there, 52 staff were trained to take PCR test samples in the camp. |

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| | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ IMC completed phase one of their treatment center with the capacity of 15 beds. Two weeks ago they got the green light of expansion into another 50 beds capacity for Azraq. All staff are deployed and ready to receive the cases. They are expecting next week MoH approval to operate the center due to the current construction works. ▪ UNHCR strategy is to integrate our response to the national response. Any critical cases will be evacuated to prince Hamza hospital. Capacity building is carried on by MoH for Ramtha, Mafraq, North Badia and Basheir hospitals. ▪ In Zaatari 5,432 PCR tests were conducted. <p>Azraq</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ 63 coronavirus positive cases confirmed in Azraq of which 12 cases have completed their quarantine and treatment and were released from the Dead Sea Isolation Area and P. Hamza Hospital. Four active COVID-19 cases (a cancer patient with her three children) remain at P. Hamza Hospital, Amman, while 47 active COVID-19 cases stay in the Public Quarantine Area in Azraq camp. ▪ In Azraq 6,037 PCR tests were conducted. ▪ King Abedalla Park (KAP): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Decision made by SRD to demolish the Quarantine area in KAP due to health purposes. Active surveillance is continued there by JHAS with the support of UNRWA. - More than 300 PCR test conducted in KAP. No COVID-19 cases have yet been identified in King Abdullah Park. |

| USAID | <p>Maisa Al-Khatib from USAID provided an overview on the Multi Donor Account (MDA)/Joint Financing Agreement:</p> <p>In early 2018 the government of Jordan decided to treat Syrian access the health services with foreigner rate. Later on, donors and the Jordanian government agreed to establish the Multi Donor Account (MDA). USAID led the establishment Multi Donor Account to support Syrian refugees to access the health services with subsidies rate. In December 2018 the agreement was signed first between the Danish government and Jordan</p> |

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| | <p>government with total contribution \$15 million. In March 2019 the government of Jordan decided to allow Syrian to access the public health services with the un-insured Jordanian rate. Many Donors expressed interest to Join this account (Qatar, Canada, and the world Bank. After that Italy and Germany recently Joint with the amount of US \$5 million). In total fund is US \$85 million. It was agreed with MoH to spend around 20 million on pandemic response. The impact of the fund: the first impact to offsetting the cost of treatment fees of Syrian refugees in 2019 and for all refugees registered in 2020. The second impact is the that MDA is available as arapid fund to response to Covid-19 plan.</p> |

| Caritas | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Caritas clinics have done dispensing the second round of NCD medications in most of the clinics and we distributed ahead of time. The medications were dispensed for 3 months stock, the patients will also be followed up through the telemedicine. • Due to the increase of confirmed cases of COVID-19 we re-emphasized the infection prevention and control measures, restocked the PPE and ensured that it will be used though rational way. |
| JPS | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • JPS is continuing its activities in the secondary and tertiary health, supporting life-saving cases from both camps, and supporting lifesaving with emergency cases in the urban setting for non-Syrian POC. • Their project funded by OCHA is going smoothly. • PS noticed a remarkable need for a primary care centers and services in the Urban setting so we started to put a provisional plan and concept of notes to establish a well-organized multispecialty primary health clinics project and any donor or directories who are interested in such project are welcome to negotiate and establish a sponsored project in those aspects. • JPS had been invited to actively support the MOH COVID-19 Endemic surveillance teams, as they are supporting MoH with 10 teams in the field. |
| TDH Italy | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • TDH Italy continue providing health service through mobile clinic and Cash for Health. |

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| IOCC | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • IOCC with the partnership with IFH and support from BPRM is starting the second year of the project "inclusive relief and Empowerment for Syrian Refugees with Impairments and Disabilities in Jordan". The project has already started in Amman and Zarqa in three locations in the first year and now it's expanding to Irbid governorate; providing visual and hearing diagnosis and treatment, assistive devices such as hearing aids and eyeglasses, rehabilitation sessions such as Occupational therapy, Speech Therapy, and Special Education. Moreover, the project provides urgent ears and eye surgeries that prevent disabilities (if not treated). • The project's clinics are currently open while the staff is taking all protective measures, social distancing, checking Aman application, and using proper PPEs. |
