

Uganda Refugee Response Plan (RRP) 2020-2021

Overview


The Education sector strategy -RRP 2019-2021 is aligned to the aspirations of ERP I which aim to ensure equitable access to quality education for 567,500 children and youth in refugee-hosting districts. This is the last quarter-four of the education RRP 2019-2021 reporting period, it captures achievements of October to December 2021 to which 37 education partners contributed. This is the period to which partners were preparing for safe school reopening in January 2022.

Achievements and challenges

With guidance from MoES, MoH, and partner contributions, the education sector has registered achievements in the increased number of 4,907 teachers' remunerated salaries, 3,454 teachers capacity building on formal and non-formal continuous professional development programs, 36,476 children reached with psychosocial support services, and an increase in the number of 482 classrooms constructed. Education institutions were opened on 10 January 2022, however, the sector continues to face challenges of the inadequate number of teachers coupled with high teacher turnover rates, inadequate classrooms, latrines, increased psychosocial and protection issues among learners, which has affected their return to school. An abridged curriculum was developed with support from the National Curriculum Development Centre to support NGO partners cover lost learning during the school closures.

Key priorities

The education sector priorities are mainly targeting to vaccinate all teachers, recruit more teachers (5,166) to implement a double shift school system, construction of temporary, semi-permanent structures, additional latrines, provision of hygiene materials, and orient teachers on MTrac (a health surveillance system) to prepare for the safe reopening of school. The sector USD 10Million to adequately implement education programs following ministry guidelines for safe school reopening.ⁱ
