Contextual Background

Brief Historical background

Pugnido 2 was opened on 25 August 2015. It was established to host South Sudanese refugees who arrived in Ethiopia during the second quarter of 2015 and were residing in transit centers at Matar, Burbiyey and Pagak entry points. The relocation from Matar took place from August to January 2016.

Areas of Origin

Ethnic composition

The camp population is composed of refugees mainly from South Sudan's Upper Nile (82.6%) and Jonglei State (16.5%), while the rest came from other states.

The main ethnic groups are the Nuer, approximately 99%, and 1% from other minority mixed groups.

Administrative Structure

UNHCR provides Coordination Support, Protection, Registration, Logistics, and Technical Expertise and monitors the delivery of services.

Camp management and coordination, protection, registration, distribution of Food and Core Relief Items, Primary education, Health services and Security is conducted by Ethiopia's governmental body the Administration for Refugee and Returnee Affairs (ARRA)

UN Agencies (WFP) and **Partners** (IRC, AAH, NRC, PIE, DRC and RaDO) are on ground and work together with ARRA and UNHCR in the provision of various essential services in 2016

Pugnido 2 camp is situated about 2 km to the north of Old Nuer Site (Pugnido 1) and 12 km from Pugnido town. Its development is still in progress.

Operations and Services

Protection: Core protection activities include continuous new birth registration, documentation, protection counselling, individual case management and referral of child protection issues and other protection concerns of which SGBV, assistance to persons with specific needs, and community mobilization/empowerment. There are **141 unaccompanied minors** and **2,230 separated children** (UNHCR proGres database). Community-based alternative care arrangements for these children are in place in the camp. The three Child Friendly Spaces registered **3,695 children** with **45% as girls,** who participated in cultural, educational and recreational activities. A total of **1,135** youth with **39% as female,** participated in sports and recreational activities.

Education: Pre-school enrollment was at **1,750** children with (48.3% girls). Primary school enrolment was **2,876** students (**37.5%** girls). Some key indicators: teacher/students–**1:55** (standard 1:50); classroom/students – **1:105** (standard 1:50); desk/students – **1:5** (standard 1:3); pupil/textbook ratio in Grades 1-4 conform to the standard of 1:1 in only two subjects. There is no secondary school in Pugnido 2 camp. However, **153** students with only 8 girls attend secondary school in Pugnido 1 camp located about 12 kilometres away from Pugnido 2 camp.

WASH: Water distributed – **20.48** litres per person per day. Tap/persons ratio – **1:98**; Latrine coverage – **27.8%**. The target of 748 latrines (adjusted from 1,600) latrines to be constructed during the year have been completed.

Health/Nutrition: A total of **1,961** outpatient consultations were recorded among which, children under five were 36.3%. The three top cases of morbidity were **malaria** (21%), **lower respiratory tract infection** (13%), and **upper respiratory tract infection** (13%). Global Acute Malnutrition (GAM) rate is 16% (March 2017 UNHCR SENS results). Health education activities reached **2,400** refugees.

Food Distribution: A total of **11,389 refugees (65.9%)** collected their monthly food ration. The food basket consisted of cereal (13.5kg), corn soy blend (0.5 kg), pulse (1.5 kg), vegetable oil (0.9 kg) and salt (0.15kg).

Shelter: Construction of 190 shelters for individuals/households with specific needs been completed.
