Hello, we're Good Chance.

We began in the Calais Jungle refugee camp in 2015, when we built our first ever "Theatre of Hope" to bring people living in the camp together with artists and volunteers from around the world for conversations, connections and creations.

After the camp was demolished, we created the play, **The Jungle**, to shine a light on the refugee crisis and help start a global conversation around immigration. Multi-award-winning "theatre that shakes hands with the world", The Jungle had critically acclaimed sold-out runs from the Young Vic theatre and London's West End to New York and San Francisco, and will return to tour the US in 2021.

As well as our **Domes** and **Productions**, we also have an **Ensemble** of refugee artists we collaborate with to create visionary new art.

Good Chance build temporary theatres of hope, and created a space for artistic expression and sharing in the heart of the "Jungle" camp in Calais. We should never underestimate the importance of hope and compassion. Theatre and art can be a way to foster hope and connect with our common humanity.

And while the world may experience temporary periods of isolation and disruption to daily life over the coming months, many of the 70.8 million asylum seekers and refugees who've fled their homes have already had their lives disrupted and experience isolation permanently, not to mention experience the deep presence of racism in society.








It's time for change

We believe now is the time for the arts, artists and people of goodwill to help the world bridge the gap of understanding and inequality. To create **art, empathy and community** so the world doesn't forget refugees and asylum seekers trying to start new lives.





Now's the time for positive action, for art, community and storytelling. To hear directly from people on the move – about their lives, dreams and hopes, about migration, war, climate change and social and racial injustice.





In 2021, and under circumstances we could never have dreamed of when we set out to do this, we will walk through Europe in solidarity with refugees.





As the continent emerges from lockdown, we will walk through its open spaces and streets with a 3m-tall puppet of a young refugee called **Little Amal**, to tell a new story of hope and humanity.

Adhering to local social distancing regulations, but with our imaginations unrestricted by them, we will make art with local communities, theatres and artists from refugee and immigrant backgrounds.









There will be dance, music, storytelling, painting, theatre, puppetry, poetry and more. Sometimes it will be planned in advance, wherever possible it'll be spontaneous.

Together we will draw attention to, and celebrate, the **opportunities offered by migration** and create new long-lasting relationships between people of different cultures and experience.

Our global audience will join us, online and in real life, to share Little Amal's story, and the stories of the thousands of people she will meet.








At the heart of our project is a young refugee who's simply trying to walk through the world. To find her mother, to get back to school, to start a new life.

We want to see some big changes





At the heart of The Walk is the possibility of play, learning and joy, even in the harshest of circumstances. We want to shine a light on the story of hundreds of thousands of young refugees who have made similar journeys over the last five years, as well as support young refugees by fundraising for future learning opportunities across the duration of The Walk.

We want to provide a platform for girls and women to take part in art and theatre activities together, tell their stories to a wider audience and influence policy makers.








Change for refugee artists



We will co-create new art with hundreds of refugee artists on the route, offering them paid work and mentoring opportunities, increasing their international profile and creating new connections between them and their local communities.





We cannot seek migrant justice unless we also seek racial justice. Where local communities are struggling to integrate with newly arrived people, and where there is social and racial injustice, we will provide innovative cultural experiences that can help mediate difficult conversations and resolve community tensions.
