- girls ages 14-17
- parents and caregivers of adolescent girls
- key informants







Community Validation Workshops

Goals:

- To share findings back with the community
- To validate research findings with community feedback
- To understand how COVID-19 had impacted data from Uganda

Workshops held with girls and caregivers in research sites in Uganda (in-person) and in Jordan (via Zoom). Feedback was incorporated into research findings.

CHILD MARRIAGE RESEARCH, PHASE II

1. Addressing violence within the home is essential to preventing child marriage in crises

CHILD MARRIAGE RESEARCH, PHASE II

2. Peers continue to have a strong influence in marriage decisions for girls in displacement settings

CHILD MARRIAGE RESEARCH, PHASE II

3. Girls often play a role in marriage decision-making

"[The girl] is the one choosing the man, and she will bring him home herself. These days, they don't choose husbands for girls, *they* make their choices."

- older girl, Bidi Bidi

"Some of the parents do not help us, forcing us to stay home and stop going to school. Then when we get pregnant, they forcefully send us to get married and leave their homes." – older girl, Palorinya

4. Displaced communities still want awareness-raising and sensitization on child marriage

5. Breaking down barriers to education for girls is as critical as ever in preventing and responding to child marriage

6. Financial support is a crucial component of child marriage programming



Impact of COVID-19

CHILD MARRIAGE RESEARCH, PHASE II

Community Validation Workshops with girls and caregivers explored:

- Impact of COVID-19 and restrictions on adolescent girls
- Impact of COVID-19 and restrictions on child marriage
- Whether earlier findings remain relevant during the pandemic

Findings: COVID-19 & Child Marriage

CHILD MARRIAGE RESEARCH, PHASE II

Girls and caregivers reported the following two reasons that child marriage is on the rise in their communities:

- 1. Girls fear schools will never reopen, so resort to early pregnancies and marriages (Palorinya and Obongi)
- 2. Girls may marry national in order to obtain land for cultivation

What Girls Need During COVID-19

CHILD MARRIAGE RESEARCH, PHASE II

Girls and caregivers reported the following three service needs:

- 1. Vocational skills training to improve their economic situations
- 2. Free safe spaces or youth corners where adolescent girls can receive SRH services and advice without fear of contracting COVID-19 (Palorinya)
- 3. Continuous sensitization for parents and the community on the negative impacts of child marriage



Next Steps: Phase III

Save the Children & Human Rights Center

- Hold intervention design workshop to discuss programming implications and develop ToC
- Select pilot location and co-design model with Save and Plan teams
- Fundraise for Phase 3
- Design and implement mixed-method longitudinal evaluation to understand how pilot influences child marriage knowledge, attitudes, and practices among adolescents and caregivers, as well as other indicators

Review/ amendment of BCP

- BCP last updated in September
- Includes a prioritization tool and guidelines on programs
- Prioritized activities:
 - Case management
 - Emergency/ urgent face-to-face
 - Alternative care, including monitoring (unless SC-SC under good care)
 - Community-based activities, including awareness activities
- Need for updating, feedback by 18 June to UNHCR co-chair




