







Age and Gender of Refugee Population Age and Gender of Asylum Seekers Population






Asylum Seekers Population by Country of Origin


Refugee Population by Type of Location



Situation Overview


During this period, the refugee population in the DRC increased considerably from 517,108 on 11/30/2021 to 524,148 on 12/31/2021, an increase of 7,040 people. The increase of 7,040 people in the number of refugees during the month of December is explained by the registration of new arrivals from South Sudan (620), the registration of 4,180 births: Burundians (65), Central Africans (2,824), South Sudanese (1,175), Rwandans (116) and regularizations of 2,240 people: Burundians (35), South Sudanese (506), Central Africans (1,686) and Rwandans (13). The decrease in the number of refugees on December 31 is due to the repatriation of Rwandans (108) and Central Africans (1,075) and the inactivation (absence during verification or spontaneous departure) of South Sudanese (23). As of December 31, the number of asylum seekers in the DRC is 2,222 including: 63 Central Africans, 1,114 Burundians, 74 Rwandans, 731 South Sudanese and 240 of other nationalities.

Refugee Population by Province in DRC







2. Number of children of primary school age: 144,424 people



Of all refugees in the Democratic Republic of Congo, children of primary school age constitute 44.6% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are made up of Rwandans (39.62%) and Central Africans (41.55%) and is distributed almost evenly between girls (49.71%) and boys (50.29%).

3. Number of children of secondary school age: 87,366 people



Of all refugees in the Democratic Republic of Congo, children of secondary school age constitute 27% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are made up of Rwandans (45.12%) and Central Africans (37.90%) and is distributed almost evenly between girls (49.44%) and boys (50.56%). It should also be noted that 10,878 children (of which 3,645 are from the host population) in the North and South Ubangi provinces are targeted by the ECW (Education Cannot Wait) program.

C) Documentation (issued by the Government): 59,022 Burundian, Central African and South Sudanese refugees living in camps / sites, aged 12 and over, all have refugee ID cards (the total population living in camps / sites is 123,117 people). Out of 524,148 refugees and asylum seekers living in the DRC as of December 31, 2021, 375,823 have received protection documents; or 71.7% of the total population.




Central African Refugee Population by Type of Location

Comments about the figures of Central African refugees

The security situation in the Central African Republic (CAR) deteriorated during the period preceding or following the presidential and legislative elections of December 27, 2020. This situation resulted in an influx of refugees in neighboring countries and in particular in the DRC in the provinces of North Ubangi, South Ubangi and Bas Uele. As of December 31, 2021, the number of Central African refugees is 212,895. 1,075 people were repatriated to the Central African Republic in December from the Boyabu camps. This means that the number of Central African refugees and asylum seekers in the DRC is therefore equal to 212,958 people, including 212,895 refugees and 63 asylum seekers. As of November 30, we had already issued 20,959 refugee identity cards.









2. Number of children of primary school age: 60,003 people



Of all Central African refugees, children of primary school age constitute 47.8% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are found in the provinces of North Ubangi (57.73%), Sud Ubangi (23.09%) and Bas-Uele (19.06%). These children of primary school age are distributed almost evenly between girls (50.36%) and boys (49.64%).

3. Number of children of secondary school age: 33,115 people



Of all Central African refugees, children of secondary school age constitute 26.4% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are found in the provinces of North Ubangi (58.19%), Sud Ubangi (25.49%) and Bas-Uele (16.16%). These children of secondary school age are distributed almost evenly between girls (50.66%) and boys (49.34%).









Age and Gender of Refugee Population




Age and Gender of Asylum Seekers



South Sudanese Refugee Population by Type of Location




Location of South Sudanese Refugees in DRC

Comments about the figures of South Sudanese refugees

The situation of the South Sudanese refugee population underwent a small slight decrease during the month of December 2021.

The overall figures of our South Sudanese beneficiaries who are in our 3 sites (Biringi, Meri and Bele) are in total 35,987 or 63.9% of the overall South Sudanese refugee population (56,341).

All the refugees living in the 3 sites have identity documents issued by the CNR with technical support from the UNHCR. However, most ID cards expired at the end of the year 2021.









2. Number of children of primary school age: 15,347 people



Of all South Sudanese refugees, children of primary school age constitute 46% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are found in the provinces of Haut Uele (74.48%) and Ituri (25.4%). These children of primary school age are distributed almost evenly between girls (49.78%) and boys (50.22%).

3. Number of children of secondary school age: 8,047 people



Of all South Sudanese refugees, children of secondary school age constitute 24% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are found in the provinces of Haut Uele (77.27%) and Ituri (22.49%). These children of secondary school age are distributed almost evenly between girls (49.41%) and boys (50.59%).





Burundian Refugee Population by Type of Location

281 Burundian refugees were repatriated to their country of origin in November 2021.

From January 1 to November 30, 2021, 7,296 Burundian refugees were repatriated to their country of origin. The number of Burundian refugees in the DRC is equal to 41,031.

All Burundian refugees have identity documents issued by CNR with technical support from UNHCR.





Of all Burundian refugees, children of primary school age constitute 44% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are in the province of South Kivu (96.66%). These children of primary school age are distributed almost evenly between girls (50.01%) and boys (49.99%).

3. Number of children of secondary school age: 6,269 people



Of all Burundian refugees, children of secondary school age constitute 25% of refugee children of school age. The majority of these children are in the province of South Kivu (95.49%). These children of secondary school age are distributed almost evenly between girls (49.64%) and boys (50.36%).
