Coordination updates	<ul> <li>IACU presented JRP/3RP:</li> <li>JRP is the Jordan chapter included in the 3RP that covers 5 countries: Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey.</li> <li>JRP includes line ministries budgets and the Inter-Agency appeal, while the 3RP includes the Inter-Agency appeal.</li> <li>The JRP has 7-12 task forces lead by line ministries, while the 3RP has 8 sectors.</li> <li>Organizations report JRP activities on JORISS and 3RP activities on ActivityInfo.</li> <li>Government representatives are invited to attend all sector meetings.</li> <li>The Jordan response plan (JRP) is the primary government-led strategic aid coordination in Jordan for both resilience and refugee pillars. Updates from GBV/CP/CfP/Coordinat ion in the South/PWG Irbid/Azraq/Mafraq/Za tari

- Irbid office: Irbid CP GBV SWG meeting took place on 10 November 2021. The discussions focused on the preparation of the 16 days of activism joint activity which was conducted virtually. A story telling activity developed by GBV SWG was presented and KAP volunteers attended. Audience shared that the females are considered vulnerable in the community and subjected to different types of GBV including the denial of the resources. They added that they should have strong will, seek support to achieve their goals, and raise their voice. Islamic relief shared a presentation on emotional abuse. NHF shared a video on cybercrimes. On 24 November, Irbid coordination working group (ICWG) had a meeting and members shared updates. TDH returned to work in Irbid. IRJ renewed the mobile clinic agreement to provide service for the next year. NHF is providing awareness raising sessions on the Cyber Crimes in cooperation with the MOI.
- Irbid Disability and Age Task Force (DATF) meeting took place. JOHUD is in the process to renew the agreements with special education and will have a rehabilitation center next year. NHF prepared an event in Irbid on the International Day of Persons with disabilities on 2 December 2021. HI are conducting the rehabilitation session. ICMC are planning to conduct livelihoods training throughs the vocational center.
- Zatari and Mafraq:
- 16 Days of Activism: Under the coordination of Zatari CP-GBV SWG, 56
  activities are being carried out to mark the 16 days campaign from the
  25th of November to the 10th of December. The Zatari Camp
  Interagency activity was held on the 2nd of December.
- Zatari Child Marriage Task Force: Zatari Child Marriage TF was created under the Zatari PWG to develop an interagency, inter-sectoral prevention and response strategy regarding child marriage in Zatari camp by the 31st of March 2022. The TF is compiling evidence from 5 areas to achieve: (1) review of previous Zatari child marriage studies, (2) mapping of ongoing child marriage and gender norms activities in the camp, (3) KIIs with Zatari governmental partners and other experts, (4) FGDs with diverse groups of the Zatari community, and (5) liaising with non-Protection sector leads.
- 2021 review and 2022 planning: Zatari PWG monthly meeting on the 29th of November. Members began reflecting on 2021 – namely, the achievements, challenges, and lessons learned. The PWG also started preliminary planning for 2021. The goal is to finalize the Zatari PWG's 2022 Workplan by the end of January.
- Azraq Camp: joint CP and GBV meeting took place on the 17<sup>th</sup> of November. A presentation by DRC on resilient youth, 16 days activities, training by IRC and EJC. Protection coordination meeting in EJC with different organizations discussing the 16 days activities, in addition to challenges, referral pathways and updates. Azraq 16 days activities took place on the 25<sup>th</sup> of Nov in Village 6 and SRAD was involved. 2 PSEA sessions in Azraq camp. Attending FPDA workshop that will be presented. Next meeting will take place on the 15<sup>th</sup> of December.
- GBV SWG: 16 days of activism from the 25<sup>th</sup> of November-10<sup>th</sup> of December. The national theme is political violence but sense this theme does not go along with refugees' concerns, FGDs took place and decided on the sub-theme that is controlling behaviors and technology

Updates from the	violence. 3 joint activities developed key messages and other events. last Thursday a joint event with different activities took place where Zatari camp, Irbid office, Azraq camp and Mafraq office participated. Link of the calendar: https://data2.unhcr.org/en/documents/details/89880  - CFP Task Force was included to be part of Basic needs WG. CFP TF participated in the BN WG that took place on the 1st of November, focusing on calculating the amount of cash to give CFP. MEB was finalized and will be shared with members.  - PSEA Network: The PSEA network met on November 30 and focused on reviewing draft key messages for community engagement, which were developed by UNHCR headquarters. The draft is meant to be reviewed by country operations and then localized based on discussion between partners and with persons of concern. The Jordan PSEA network reviewed the various questions focusing on explaining what SEA is, who it is perpetrated by who can report, how is reporting done, what happens after reporting, etc. Members began proposing how best to adapt these messages to the Jordan context, including adding reference to existing pathways like the Amaali app, ensuring messaging is done using AGD and considering the various nationalities of persons of concern present, etc. The PSEA Networks' initial comments will be shared with the PWG for additional feedback.  - DATF: The DATF organized several activities to celebrate the International Day of Persons with Disabilities on 03 December. It shared joint messages with key actions to be taken by communities, humanitarian actors and decision-makers to foster disability inclusion and published a video on UNHCR's Twitter and Instagram pages highlighting the abilities and contributions of Jordanian and Syrian volunteers with disabilities in their communities. On 03 December, UNHCR and its partners supported the initiative "Our World" organized by Rafeeq, a local non-profit working on psychosocial support for persons with disabilities. During the event, persons with disabilitie

- Q: Any plans for including Irbid for next year?
- A: Irbid will be included and will receive the invitation for December training.
- SOS: received funding to open a shelter for women and children. The shelter provides a home for women with their children for few months and help them deal with problems by legal counselling, economic empowerment sessions, etc. The shelter allows children to stay with their mothers up to the age of 14 years old which has been a challenge for other shelters. Two shelters were built, one in Amman and one in Irbid. Collaborating with AWU to replicate the shelter model that they have.
- **JOHUD** continues to assist Syrians, Non-Syrians, and vulnerable Jordanians PoCs among the main components (Protection, Inclusion, and Education). Celebrating the International Day of People with disabilities. Celebrating the week of Child with disabilities at JOHUD's CDCs through implementing inclusive educational, and recreational activities. - Services and activities: continuing to support about (300) people with disabilities and older people with accommodative equipment such as hearing aids, visual aids, wheelchairs, crutches, as well as, enrolling them with physiotherapy and speech therapy services. Conducting psycho-social support activities includes parental care, group and individual counseling, and elderly club activities. Targeting about (170) non-Syrian students (Iraqi, Sudanese, and Somalis) to enroll them with homework support classes sessions (Arabic, Math, and English). Cashfor-education service through covering the monthly school transportation fees, school fees, and school kits. Continuing to Implement the daily educational sessions for the students on Kolibri offline platform. CSCs members designed and implemented various activities targeting about (7000) PoCs.
- JOHUD has started to train the staff on PSEA and will continue for the upcoming months through TOT trainers.
- JRF: continues provision of Intervention and prevention activities and services in JRF centers located in Amman, Aqaba, and in 13 different CBOs located in 10 different governorates in partnership with UNHCR and UNICEF. JRF started the implementation of OCHA project in 5 different governorates, focusing in providing Intervention and prevention activities and services.
  - Conducted different specialized trainings such as: Case Management, SOPs, child OSE, interview techniques for children, protocol of care for Dar al Hanan was developed during this year and the training on the protocol is now undergoing for Dar staff.
- In the process of launching the second campaign tackling protecting Children from OSE with partnership with UNICEF.



King Group	Conducted many activities under 16 days of activism in different locations. The Art Gallery under "She Leads" project, was opened during 1- 5 December. It displayed the artwork of 113 GYW who participated in expressive art workshops, and their work conveyed strong messages that highlighted their journey.  Next CP safe referral training will be on the 15th of December and will be online.  - Care International: continuing with same services for next year, case management, PSS, and cash distribution in all areas that care is covering. Care implemented the 16 days in camps with several activities and provided trainings against GBV for men and boys to engage them more.  - ARDD: a project with OCHA, DRC, Swiss Embassy and UNHCR, providing legal protection services for all nationalities in urban and camps. Working with WFP and UNHCR on a small relief project for distributing food voucher to target most vulnerable people who stopped receiving food assistance. Key messages distribution, post for international volunteering day. Localization award to Peter Anderson.  - IFH: available training funded by the Irish Embassy for doctors and nurses working with COVID-19 cases. The training is important to release stress for health workers in MoH. Marinating case management response and prevention in camps and different governments. Different activities for the 16 days of activism including self-defence classes for women and men and building capacity of women and girls in community by providing self-defence classes. Online and offline activities that refugees appreciate as they are easy and accessible like awareness sessions on cyber harassment with cybercrime department. Child labour campaigns and awareness sessions in collaboration with ILO.  - TDH-Italy: organized an open day in Zarqa on 2 December for the 16 days of activism and dedicated activities for children and for women by
