- Increasing negative coping

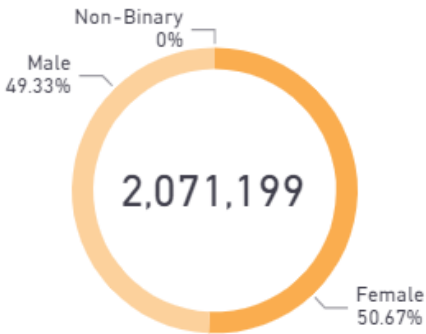
What BNWG partners provide:

- ESSN/C-ESSN continue to address needs of most vulnerable households in Türkiye
- Few complementary CBIs available by other partners
- Food assistance continues in TACs
- Hygiene item distribution continues, mostly in SET
- Shelter support continues through expert organisations in SET
- Capacity strengthening and infrastructure support to municipalities and public institutions

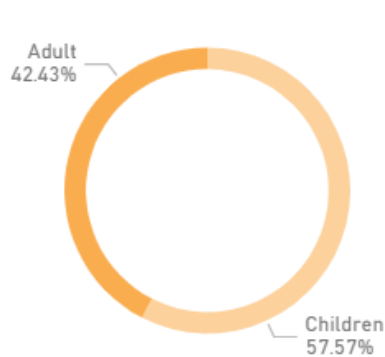
Basic Needs Beneficiaries Reached by Province



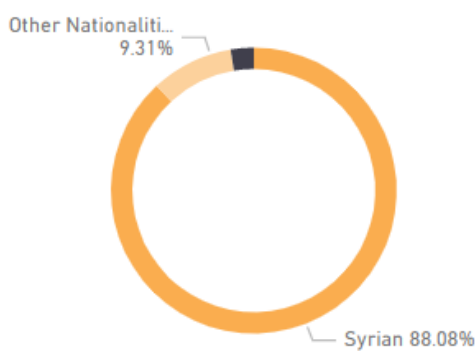
Breakdown by Gender



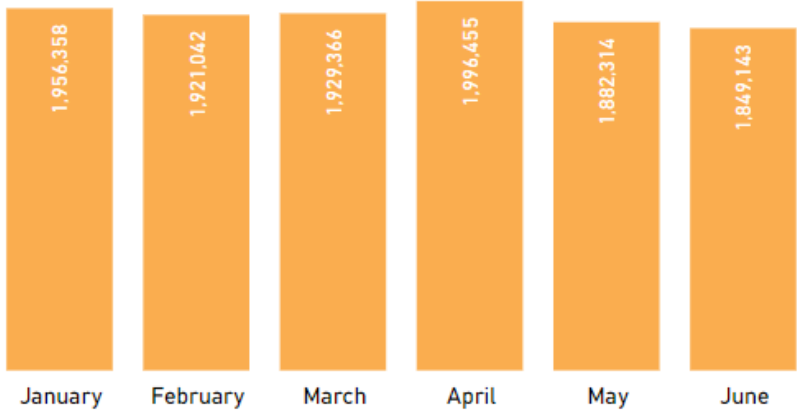
Breakdown by Age



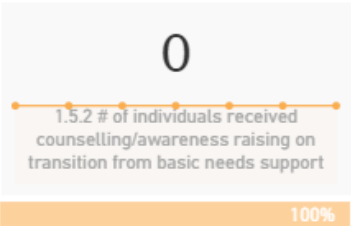
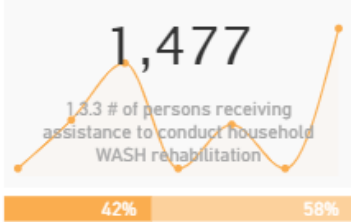
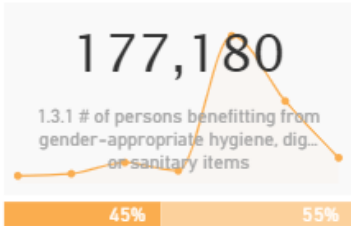
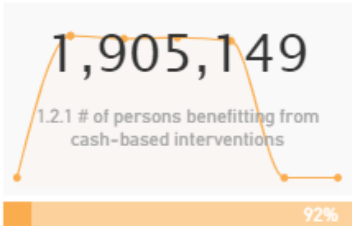

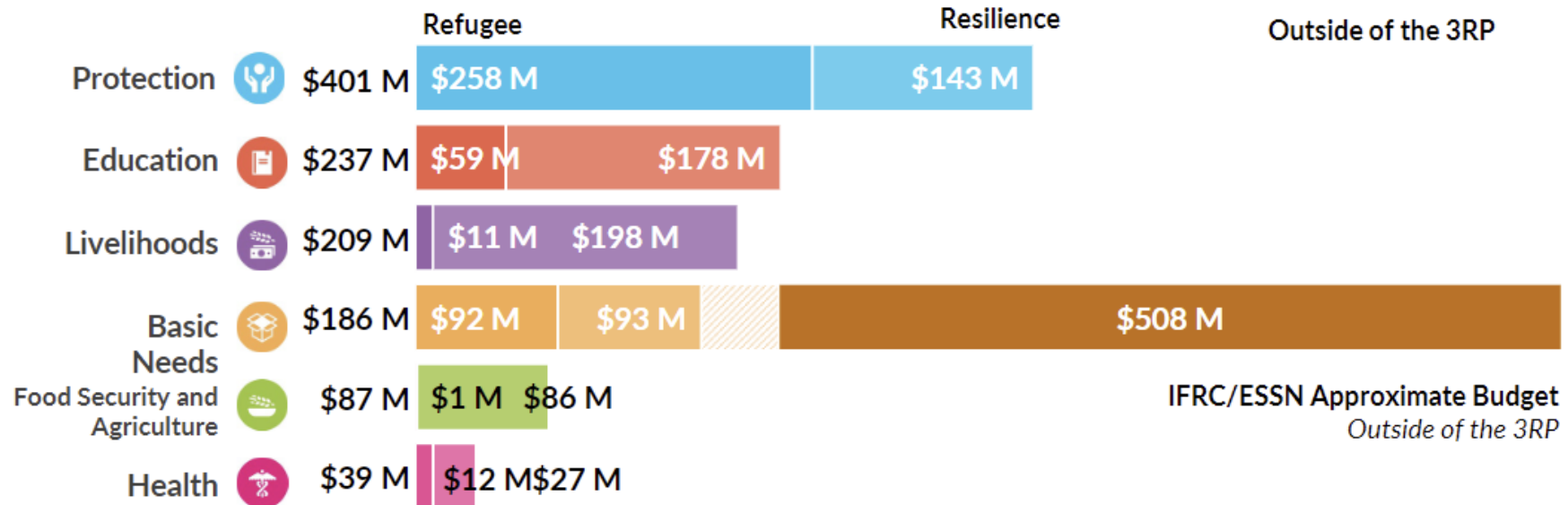

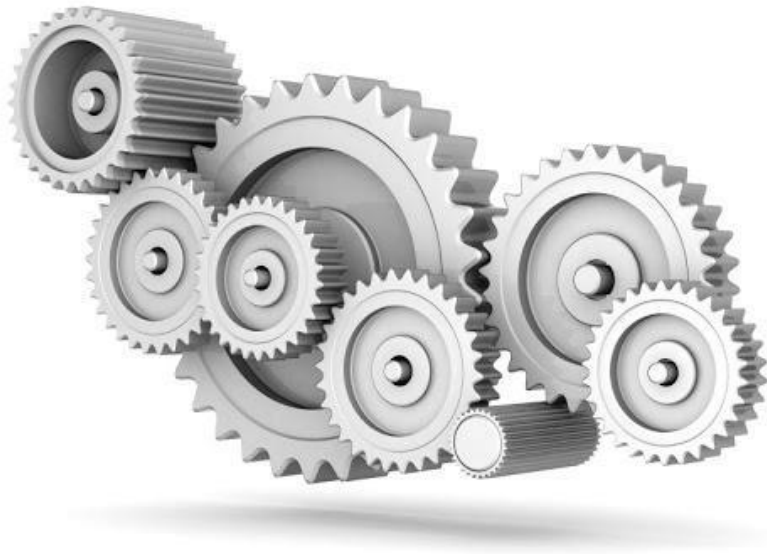
