

Guyana hosts 19,643 refugees To mark the 16 Days of Activism against and migrants from Venezuela, as Gender-Based Violence (GBV) UNHCR well as 177 refugees and asylum held an awareness session on gender seekers of other nationalities, equality and GBV prevention for 40 participants.

The Government of Guyana continues issuing three-month stay permits to Venezuelans who arrive in the country. These permits can be extended for six months and require periodic renewal.


CONTEXT

UNHCR supports the government in the provision of assistance and protection services to refugees and migrants with specific needs, and to vulnerable host communities while working in coordination with other Interagency Response Platform partners.

UNHCR delivers humanitarian aid, including food hampers and sanitary items, as well as support and counseling to facilitate access to government services for refugees and migrants.

Gender-based Violence continues to be a major problem, particularly for vulnerable Venezuelan refugee and migrant women who engage in survival sex as a coping mechanism and indigenous women. Trafficking-in-Persons and Child Protection risks are also consistently present concerns, especially in mining areas.

UNHCR Response and Strategy

UNHCR works with four partners in Guyana and supports the State in the delivery of assistance and protection services to refugees, migrants, asylum seekers, and host communities. UNHCR works in coordination with other response partners to provide access to education, food security, health, integration, protection, shelter, WASH, and cash assistance, among others. Main Activities

Alongside the government, partner organizations, civil society, development actors, and UN Agencies, UNHCR undertakes protection and solutions activities, including:

Protection | UNHCR provided information on access to protection services to 463 refugees and migrants (155 women, 154 men, 70 girls, 84 boys). UNHCR accompanied 216 persons (79 women, 70 men, 30 girls, and 37 boys) to relevant government services, including the Immigration Department, for access to stay permits, justice and legal support.

Gender-based Violence In remote mining areas, UNHCR and partner Guyana Sex Work Coalition (GSWC), sensitized 100 women who engage in survival sex on HIV, sexually transmitted infections and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights. GSWC provided HIV testing and counselling to 113 women and distributed 98 hygiene kits. A total of 18 key community members were sensitized on GBV, and 172 people were counselled on GBV prevention and referral pathways. Some 109 people participated in community-based initiatives, including awareness raising on the importance of renewing stay permits. HIAS provided case management services to 18 GBV survivors. UNHRC through Partner Blossom Inc. conducted 19 forensic interviews with Venezuelan and Guyanese children who survived sexual abuse. Case management services were provided to 14 Venezuelan children.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) UNHCR delivered 133 hygiene kits to 65 refugee and migrant households. UNHCR also donated 26 jerry cans to 20 households. In addition, the Agency distributed 16 baby kits to pregnant women and families with newborn babies in Regions 1, 2 and 4.

Cash-based interventions and in-kind assistance | UNHCR through HIAS distributed multi-purpose cash assistance to 279 refugees and migrants. In addition, UNHCR distributed 142 food hampers to 99 households that were unable to meet their basic needs in Regions 1, 2 and 4.

Health | In Regions 1, 2 and 4, UNHCR accompanied and provided counselling on access to health services, such as sexual and reproductive health and rights, immunization and Covid-19 prevention. In November, UNHCR supported health workers in a vaccination campaign at Farm Corps, Region 1, home to 200 indigenous individuals from Venezuela.

Education In partnership with the Ministry of Education, UNHCR supported access to education and integration of 49 children in Regions 1,3 and 7 through English as Second Language (ESL) classes. With the same purpose, UNHCR implemented community-based ESL classes for 237 out-of-school children in remote areas in Region 1, including indigenous communities.


